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AUDIT RESULTS

Results in brief

This report describes the overall results and conclusions for the areas we examined. In those selected areas, Port operations complied, in all material respects, with applicable state laws, regulations, and its own policies, and provided adequate controls over the safeguarding of public resources.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity, policy, internal control, or area. As a result, no information is provided on the areas that were not examined.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the Port of Anacortes from January 1, 2019 through December 31, 2019.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

This audit was conducted under the authority of RCW 43.09.260, which requires the Office of the State Auditor to examine the financial affairs of all local governments. Our audit involved obtaining evidence about the Port's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters. The procedures performed were based on our assessment of risks in the areas we examined.

Based on our risk assessment for the year ended December 31, 2019, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. We examined the following areas during this audit period:

- Accounts Payable – general disbursements and electronic fund transfers
- Tracking and monitoring of theft sensitive assets, such as computers, tools, and equipment
- Procurement – public works and professional services

INFORMATION ABOUT THE PORT

The Port of Anacortes is a municipal corporation of the State of Washington, created in 1926 to provide for the development and maintenance of harbors and terminals, promote tourism, and foster economic activity in its district. With one of eight natural deep water marine terminal facilities in Puget Sound, its nearly 1,000 slip marina, and its roughly 90 acres of commercial properties, the Port is instrumental to the success and economic development of the community. The Port is independent from other local or state governments and has geographic boundaries consisting of Fidalgo, Guemes, Cypress, Sinclair, and other neighboring islands, and a small strip of land bordering Padilla Bay up to and including Samish Island.

The Port serves approximately 22,000 citizens and is governed by an elected, five-member Board of Commissioners. The Board appoints an Executive Director to oversee the Port's daily operations as well as approximately 60 to 70 full-, part-time and seasonal employees. The Port operated on expenditures of \$16.8 million in fiscal year 2019.

The Port also administers the Port of Anacortes Industrial Development Corporation, which was created to issue tax-exempt, non-recourse bonds to finance industrial development within Port boundaries. The corporation is governed by the Port Commissioners.
